Overall Nature of the Paper

History & Culture: 14–16 questions

Polity & Governance: 15–17 questions

Geography: 16–18 questions

Environment & Ecology: 18–20 questions

Economy: 13–15 questions

Science & Technology: 10–12 questions

Current Affairs (Integrated): 20–25 questions

History & Art & Culture

Moderate difficulty level. Questions covered Ancient, Medieval, Modern History, Freedom Struggle, Buddhism, Jainism, temple architecture, literature, and cultural heritage.

Indian Polity & Governance

Moderate difficulty level with analytical and constitutional interpretation-based questions. Governance and institutional application questions were prominent.

Geography

Moderate to difficult. Focused on physical geography, climate, rivers, tectonics, mapping, and environment-linked geography concepts.

Environment & Ecology

Difficult section with high emphasis on biodiversity, climate change, Ramsar sites, National Parks, conservation initiatives, and ecological concepts.

Economy

Moderate to difficult. Questions tested conceptual understanding of inflation, banking, monetary policy, fiscal policy, taxation, and economic indicators.

Science & Technology

Moderate difficulty. Focused on biotechnology, AI, space technology, health science, semiconductor technology, and current scientific developments.

Current Affairs Trend

Most current affairs were integrated with static subjects. Pure factual questions were fewer compared to issue-based and application-oriented questions.

Key Trends Observed

- Statement-based questions dominated the paper.
- Current affairs and static integration increased.
- Environment remained highly important.
- Geography became more analytical.
- Conceptual clarity and elimination techniques were essential.

Estimated General Category cut-off: 85–92 marks depending on overall difficulty level.
